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I. Introduction

Some of the characteristics of Philip are described on page 121. How could Jesus shape Philip for <u>greatness</u> when he was not a <u>visionary</u> ?

Assume you are a church leader, would you be able to work with someone like Philip?

II. Outline of Chapter 6

A. Philip: His Calling-Review pages 121-124

1. Philip is the first disciple chosen by Jesus. Jesus physically sought out Philip, and he was the first one to whom Jesus actually said, "Follow me."

2. Philip was an *eager* and willing disciple.

3. Philip had a seeking heart, which is evident by how he responded to Jesus.

4. Philip had obviously been studying the Law and the Prophets and was <u>seeking</u> the <u>Messiah</u>.

5. The Lord found Philip, but Philip felt he found the Lord. Both things are true from the human perspective. But from a biblical perspective, we know that <u>God's choice</u> is the determinative one. "You did not choose me, but I <u>chose you</u> and <u>appointed you</u>." John 15:16.

6. Philip not only had a <u>seeking heart</u>, but he also had the <u>heart of</u> a <u>personal</u> <u>evangelist</u>. His first response upon meeting Jesus was to <u>find his friend</u> Nathanael and tell him about the Messiah.

7. Philip was <u>ready</u> to <u>receive</u> Jesus. He was <u>expectant</u>. His <u>heart</u> <u>was</u> <u>prepared</u>. He <u>gladly</u> <u>received</u> Jesus.

B. The Feeding of the Five Thousand-Review pages 124-127

1. Philip's heart was right. He was a man of faith. Often he was a man of weak faith.

2. Why did Jesus single Philip out and ask him , "Where shall we buy bread, that these may eat ?"

3. Was Philip overly concerned with organization and protocol?

4. Philip was the type of person who in every meeting says, "I don't think we can do that."- the master of the impossible.

5. Jesus was testing Philip. John says Jesus already knew what He Himself was going to do. He was testing Philip so that Philip would reveal to himself what he was like.

6. According to John 6:7, all that <u>pessimistic</u> Philip could see was the <u>impossibility</u> of the <u>situation</u>.

7. When Jesus tested Philip's faith, he responded with <u>open unbelief</u>. It can't be done.

8. Philip's thoughts about how to meet this great need were <u>pessimistic</u>, <u>analytical</u>, and <u>pragmatic</u>, completely <u>materialistic</u> and <u>earthbound</u>.

9. One of the supreme essentials of leadership is a <u>sense</u> of vision, why ? Is a a sense of vision important for Greater Pleasant Branch ?

10. Philip was so obsessed with this <u>temporal predicament</u> that he was oblivious to the <u>transcendental possibilities</u> of Jesus' power.

11. Philip was convinced that the feeding of the multitude simply could not be done. The <u>limitless supernatural power</u> of <u>Christ</u> had completely escaped his thinking.

12. Everything seemed impossible to Philip. He needed to set aside his <u>materialistic</u>, <u>pragmatic</u>, <u>common-sense</u> concerns and learn to lay hold to the <u>supernatural</u> <u>power</u> of <u>faith</u>.

C. The Visit of the Greeks-Review pages 128-130

1. John chapter 12 gives us another insight into Philip's character. Again, we see his over <u>analytical temperament.He</u> was concerned too much about <u>methods</u> and <u>protocols</u>. He lacked <u>boldness</u> and <u>vision</u>. It made him too <u>timid</u> and too <u>apprehensive</u>. And when he has another opportunity to step out in faith , he misses it again.

2. The author states that Philip was a <u>by-the-book</u> type of person.

3. Philip was not a <u>decisive</u> man. There was no precedent for introducing Gentiles to Jesus, so Philip enlisted Andrew's help before doing anything.

4. Philip seems to know in his <u>heart</u> that it would be wrong to turn the Greeks away, even if his <u>head</u> was obsessed with protocol and procedure.

D. The Upper Room Discourse-Review pages 130-133

1. Of all the foolish , impetuous, heartbreakingly ignorant statements that occasionally escaped the lips of the disciples, none was more disappointing than Philips remark in the upper room, "Show us the Father , and it is sufficient for us. "-John 14:8.

2. How could Philip of all people, who had responded with such <u>enthusiastic faith</u> at the <u>beginning</u>, be making a request like this at the <u>end</u>? Where was his faith?

3. Philip's <u>earthbound thinking</u>, his <u>materialism</u>, his <u>skepticism</u>, his <u>obsession with</u> <u>mundane details</u>, his <u>preoccupation with business details</u>, and his <u>small-mindedness</u> had shut him off from a <u>full apprehension</u> of whose presence he had enjoyed.

4. Philip, like the other disciples , was a man of <u>limited ability</u>. He was a man of <u>weak faith</u>. He was a man of <u>imperfect understanding</u>. He was <u>skeptical</u>, <u>analytical</u>, <u>pessimistic</u>, <u>reluctant</u> and <u>unsure</u>. He wanted to go <u>by the book</u> all the time. <u>Facts</u> and <u>figures</u> filled his thoughts. So he was unable to grasp the <u>big picture</u> of Christ's divine

power, person and grace. He was slow to <u>understand</u>, slow to <u>trust</u>, and slow to <u>see</u> beyond the immediate circumstance. he still wanted more proof.

5. Many would have rejected Philip for the role of disciple, but Jesus would say in so many words, he is exactly what I am looking for. My strength is made perfect in weakness. I will make him a preacher. He will be one of the founders of the church. I will make him a ruler in the kingdom and give him an eternal reward in heaven. And I will write his name on one of the twelve foundation stones of the New Jerusalem.

6. Thankfully, the Lord uses people like Philip, lots of them.

7. Does I Corinthians 1:27-29 explain how the Lord was able to use people like Philip, lots of people like Philip ?
